

Technology Sub-Committee

The Committee's Mission: The Technology Sub-Committee of Rockingham United Church seeks to adhere to our church's mission to worship God, share Christ's teachings, welcome all with love, reach out, work for social justice and to care for God's creation. (Paraphrased) This is done by promoting the use of technology to assist the operations of the church office, provide technological tools for our minister, council and all volunteers which will assist them to

communicate with members/adherents, the wider church community and to reach out to the community around us. The committee supports the use of technology in the sanctuary to enhance the worship experience; supports the enhancement of our church web page and expanding the use of social media.

Sanctuary Lighting Improvements: In August of 2022, Geoff Doane and Steve MacMurray collaborated on the install of lighting to enhance the viewing of what takes place in the chancel area. Two racks of lights were hung from beams on both sides of the sanctuary, providing controllable lighting on the chancel area. These lights can be controlled from a special board mounted in the loft along with the audio and video equipment. The mood of the lighting can be altered for different events including plays, live concerts etc. We appreciate the work and knowledge of both Geoff and Steve in bringing this much needed enhancement into being in our Sanctuary.

PowerPoint Preparation & Booth Video Operators: In September we began having a rotation of five people who took on the task of preparing the PowerPoint for each Sunday's service. They received from Sylvia in the Church Office, what was known as a Tech Bulletin for the Sunday they had agreed to look after. The Order of Service had been roughed out by Rev Sarah and passed to Sylvia for the inputting of the lyrics for the selected hymns. Sylvia also went thru all the music and got the licensing information that is added to the end of each hymn or choir piece. The PowerPoint is what is shown on the screen and in the livestream during worship. I need to offer a 'great big Thank You!' to Kate Brown, Helen Doane, Dianna Prest & Doug Chaytor, each of whom have prepared for and ran the video based on an agreed schedule from September 2022 to July 30, 2023. We look forward to working with our new Minister.

RUC on YouTube: Our YouTube Channel seems to be watched by a number of people, both, members and non-members. We get between 50 to 100 on a regular basis, and, on Easter Sunday 2023 we had over 300 watching all or part of the service. The YouTube Service on Sunday is watched at Parkland Seniors Complex on Parkland Drive each Tuesday morning. Not only have we streamed weekly Worship, we have on more than one occasion streamed Memorial Services so distant loved ones can view the Memorial.

Computer Network and Church Office Automation: We have come to the realization that an outof-date network server is not the answer for our environment. Sylvia received a donation of a used desktop computer which better than her old one. With some minor updates, Sylvia will be able to produce Givings Tax Receipts in .pdf format and email them to the bulk of the congregation at yearend.

We have received a federal Grant for a Summer Student for the summer of 2023. We are focusing on a student that is studying IT to help us clean up our network as well as refresh our webpage presence.

Sunday School Programs

After doing this for a few years and having most of Year A, B and C Spark curriculum and with limitless online resources, I have not purchased new curriculum for the Sunday School as the church year goes in a cycle and Bible stories and lessons repeat themselves.

While in Sunday School children hear a Bible story that follows the United Church lectionary calendar and then do various crafts and activities that follow the theme.

Website - Social Media

RUC's Website: Rockingham United has had a website for about 20 years. Work is done on the site on a weekly basis, to bring the weekly e-updates, order of service and any other news to our wider church community. Feel free to visit our website at www.rockinghamunited.org and take a look around at all the information available.

Website Traffic: Over the years the average annual traffic has remained steady. We use Stats counter and Google Tag Manager to track stats on use of the website. Most visits happen on Friday or Saturday of each week and are higher in the Fall to Spring months than in the Summer. Whether or not cookies were placed on the visitor's system when they were on our site depends on whether they have cookies enabled on their computer. Therefore, the First Time Visits and Unique Visits can be higher than Returning Visits. Beginning April 6, 2023, as Webmaster, I have not been able to gain access to the website using software to do upgrades to it. We have had several conversations with Eastlink on this matter and on Wednesday of last week, they admitted the problem was on their end. We are monitoring this situation and are hopeful that we will have the website updated on a weekly basis once again very soon.

Social Media: Rockingham United has accounts on Facebook, Instagram, and Twitter. These social media sites are maintained by the church office and Dianna Prest. Dianna looks after Facebook on a weekly basis and events that are occurring at Rockingham United get posted to these programs as well. Facebook has become a popular source for information on happenings at Rockingham United. Just prior to September 2020, our loft configuration was changed allowing us to livestream worship to our YouTube Channel. Our worship services have been a combination of streaming live and recorded videos as well as PowerPoint screens of words for hymns, prayers, etc. Our website, YouTube Channel and our social media posts serve our congregation well, getting our message out to the church and wider community.

STEWARDSHIP

In September, we found ourselves in need of a committee Chair. Jennifer Thornton became Acting Chair, with the assistance of Sandra Taweel (Sept – Dec) and Lynn Knapp (Jan – March) at Council meetings. Other Committee members include Jack Rilett (who has also filled in at Council meetings), Santosh Lall and Beth Wilson. Our small committee has been very busy this year and are appreciative of the help received from individuals and other committees for their help with events throughout the year.

Fundscrip continues to be a great fundraiser and runs smoothly under the direction of Beth and Lynn. In the Fall of 2022, it earned \$1621.67, and to date in 2023 we have raised \$1621.67, with one more order to go in May.

In October, we saw the return of our popular Oktoberfest event and it was very successful. This was the first event where we could have alcohol, and that was well received as well. Our total revenue was \$1950.80. Many thanks to Sandra Taweel, who spear-headed this event and donated much of the meal items.

November saw the creation of a Rockingham United Cookbook, with recipe contributions from the Congregation. This was edited by Jennifer Thornton, and formatted by Sylvia Thorne, and netted a profit of \$690.

Stewardship Sundays were held in January and February of this year. We thanked the Congregation for all their gifts and later asked them to prayerfully consider increasing their givings (results below).

February Fun took place on Friday, February 3 and in addition to the fun that was had by all, they also raised \$188 for the general fund. Thanks to Beth Wilson and Kate Brown for organizing this event.

The Stewardship committee also brought forward the idea of raffles as a fundraiser. This was received with mixed reviews by the Congregation but was passed with a majority of votes. Any

committee wishing to hold a prize raffle must get permission from the Church Council before applying for a lottery license.

WORSHIP

The Worship Committee is responsible for Sunday worship as well as special services and events of a spiritual nature that take place in the sanctuary of Rockingham United Church. Meetings are held on the first Tuesday of the month from September to June. New members are always welcome.

The following is a review of a memorable year in worship at Rockingham United:

Significant work to refinish the flooring and enhance the lighting in the Chancel area was undertaken in the summer of 2023. This would not have been possible without generous donations from Claude and Mary Lou Isaacs, and Kathy MacNeil and an anonymous donor who supported upgrading the chancel lighting. The projects were supported by Mark Thornton, Geoff Doane and Steve MacMurray who lent practical and technical support. This work has beautified the sanctuary and contributes to our worship experience.

In July we welcomed our friends from Fairview United for worship who reciprocated by hosting us for worship in August. We also welcomed AST student Tamsin Robson for pulpit supply for two weeks in July.

In the fall, we returned a regular worship format, encouraging masking as a precaution following the easing of COVID restrictions. We witnessed with joy the gradual increase in attendance each week while continuing to have the service livestreamed. We joined Fairview United for a "Blessing of the Pets" service on October 4th. Worldwide Communion was observed by offering the elements 'picnic style' in small paper cups. Thanksgiving Sunday worship was especially moving as several congregation members shared symbols and spoke of life experiences for which they were most thankful. The Worship Committee planned and led the Remembrance Sunday worship on November 6th with the participation of several veterans. On November 20th a well received "Singing Our Faith" service was held featuring hymns selected by individuals who also shared the significance of their choice. In the fall of 2022, we were saddened to learn Rev. Sarah would be retiring at the end of April 2023 due to health concerns.

Throughout the year Rev. Sarah recruited amazing lay teams from the congregation to lead worship, using a theme for each season and great creativity. The Advent and Christmas season included the greatly appreciated Choir Carols by Candlelight Service and reception and the wonderful Sunday School Christmas Pageant and White Gift service. The Christmas Eve Candlelight Family service was well attended with a return to 'coming forward' communion serving over 140 people. The Worship Committee led worship on New Year's Day presenting a service of Readings and Carols.

Our new worship year began with Rev. Sarah planning a January "by request" worship series on topics contributed by the congregation. We also hosted a successful 'by donation' Soup Lunch. Unfortunately, winter conditions forced the cancellation of services on January 22nd and February 5th. Two committee members completed "Worship 101, a Training Program for Lay Worship Leaders offered by region 15. Our 168 years as a congregation was celebrated with Rev. Dr. Rob Fennell from AST as guest speaker followed by a cake reception on February 12th. Scouting Sunday was observed on February 26th. We thank Scouter Mark Thornton for organizing the colour guard, promoting the special Sunday event and for the Guide leaders who came in uniform. The Worship Committee planned and led worship on March 12th and 19th. We were very grateful for the skill of Jennifer Robbins who presented a monologue by Rev. Bev. Brazier telling the biblical story of the Woman at the Well assisted by our youth on March 12th. The season of Lent began with Ash Wednesday worship at Fairview United. "Seeking" was the theme for Lent led by Rev. Sarah and a worship team. Holy Week included sharing Maundy Thursday worship with ritual foot and hand washing with Fairview United joining us. Rev. Sarah planned and with a lay team led a moving Good Friday service and a joyful Easter Sunday Communion service. We are grateful for the loan or donation of a variety of spring plants for the Easter Garden and the treats that were shared following Easter Sunday worship. A Memorial Hymn Sing service and reception was held on April 16th as the season Easter continued to be celebrated through music and praise.
